Psa 110:1 KJV

1) **A Psalm of David.** The LORD said unto my Lord, Sit thou at my right hand, until I make thine enemies thy footstool.

The concept of Christ sitting at the right hand of God is the most often Old Testament verse quoted in the New Testament. The verses listed below are not intended to be exhaustive.

Mat_22:42-45; Mat_26:64; Act_2:34; Act_7:56; 1Co_15:25; Heb_1:3; Heb_1:13; Eph_1:20-22; Heb_10:12-13.

Angels and Angels

The book of Hebrews appears to be a commentary on the concepts found in Psalms 110. I would like for us to have a better grasp on these truths so, let's begin by looking at the word "angels" in Hebrews chapters one and two.

The word *angels* is used around eleven times in the first two chapters of Hebrews, but I **believe this word is referring to two different Old Testament words: h4397 (malak) – messenger and h430 (Elohim) – mighty one.**

By using Psalms 104:4, quoted in Hebrews 1:7, we can determine the Hebrew word meant for the book of Hebrews chapter one.

Read Hebrews chapter one.

- Who would be the messengers spoken of in this chapter?

Because Psalms 8:4-6 is quoted in Hebrews 2:5-7, we can determine the Hebrew word meant for these verses. Also, compare Psalms 82.

Read Hebrews chapter two, verses five through nine, and sixteen.
